PARABLES OF JESUS

Matthew 18:21-35

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- In the context the Lord has been teaching about church discipline (Matthew 18:15-20).

- With this question, Peter probably thought that he was going the "extra mile."
- Many Jewish rabbis taught to forgive three times, but no more!
- In Peter's mind, his righteousness was exceeding that of the scribes and Pharisees.
- He must have been shocked to hear the Lord's response.

 Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you, up to seven times, but up to seventy times seven." – Matthew 18:22

- These numbers are not meant to be taken literal. Jesus is using them to teach unlimited forgiveness.
- To drive this point home, Jesus teaches the parable found in verses 23-35.

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- One of the slaves owed him ten thousand talents (vs. 24). That is a lot of money!
- That would be equivalent to millions of dollars today. This man could not repay this debt if he worked every day of his life, for the rest of his life!

- "But since he did not have the means to repay, his lord commanded him to be sold, along with his wife and children and all that he had, and repayment to be made." (vs. 25)
- The slave begged for mercy (vs. 26).
- The king had compassion and forgave him. He released him from the debt (vs. 27).

- After receiving the king's forgiveness, the slave went and found a fellow slave who owed him a hundred denarii (vs. 28).
- The fellow slave begged for patience and mercy (vs. 29).
- The unmerciful slave refused to show mercy. He beat, choked, and threw the man in jail.

- Other slaves went and reported the events to the king (vs. 31).
- The king was very angry and disappointed with the news (vss. 32-34).
- The king summoned the unmerciful slave and asked him about his actions

- The king was no longer willing to extend to him forgiveness.
- Instead, the king would give the servant what he deserved. He would not extend to the servant what he was unwilling to extend to another.

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- In order to receive God's forgiveness, we must first be willing to forgive others!

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
