

#### Revelation Review

- 1. Chapters 1-3: The message to the churches.
  - This book is a revelation of Christ (Revelation 1:1).
  - This is a book of prophecy (Revelation 1:3).
  - This is a book of signs and symbols (Revelation 1:1).
  - This is a book written for a specific audience (Revelation 1:4).
  - The background is one of tribulation (Revelation 1:9).
  - These things must "shortly take place!" (Revelation 1:1, 3).

    Message of the book: Christ Wins (17:14)!

## THE STORY OF REVELATION

The seven seals tell us the basic story!

The seven trumpets represent God's warning.

The seven bowls represent God's full judgment!



## The Seven Trumpets



There is also a pattern that is followed.

- The first four are similar. The next two are different.
- There is an interlude (break in the action) between the sixth and seventh.
- The seven in the series are transitional.

Verses 1-4: There is silence in heaven; seven angels are given seven trumpets; the prayers of God's people go before Him; God hears their prayers.

Notes: The silence probably represents the reverence towards this event; this seventh seal being broken is the beginning of God's judgment on the empire. The angels being given the trumpets signifies God giving them authority to carry out His will. The language of verse 3 symbolizes the prayers of God's people. The language of verse 4 signifies God hearing and receiving their prayers.

**Trumpet 1:** hail and fire burn the earth's trees and grass. Vegetation is destroyed.

**Trumpet 2:** a third part of the sea becomes blood.

**Trumpet 3:** a third part of the land waters are used as instruments to bring the wicked to repentance.

Trumpet 4: a third part of the sun, moon and stars darkened.

**Chapter 9 concluded with the** sounding of the sixth trumpet. In keeping with the pattern we find in these series of seven, chapters 10-11 follow with an interlude. This break in the action is designed to give comfort and hope to the people of God during these difficult times. We need to keep this in mind as we try to interpret the visions of this interlude.
