Confusing Explanations

- Using terms that never appear in the Bible, such as 'Plan of Salvation'







Unlawful vs. Illegal

- We appear crazy for applying this logic to our interpretation of the Bible.
- Several examples from the Bible show that God considers many things "unlawful" even when not explicitly "illegal" (Matthew 12:4, Leviticus 24:5-9, 1 Chron. 13:9ff, Numbers 4:15).
- Scripture pertaining to NT worship music (Eph. 5:19, Col. 3:16) is a fitting application of 1 Cor. 4:6.
- 2 Timothy 1:13 commands us to retain a standard of sound words, like standards in cooking.



Context, Context, Context

- We do great harm when we force an explanation on scripture when context does not dictate it (John 5:18).
- To whom was the command given? Keep the Bible's timeline in your mind (Luke 16:16).
- Is it saying what you think it is? Do not assume an interpretation just because it sounds good or it is traditional.
