

MANY BOOKS, ONE STORY

- First, understand that the Bible has a cohesive story, made up of many interwoven subplots.
 There is tremendous unity, especially when one considers that it was written by more than 40 authors over a span of 1,500 years!
- There are themes from Genesis to Revelation that clearly indicate divine direction. Remember that Bible writers lived in very different cultures and time periods, yet all saw the same truths:

- The problem of evil (Gen. 6:6, Jud. 3:12, John 3:19-20).
- The hope of redemption (Ex. 6:6, Ps. 130:7, Col. 1:14).
- The virtue of faith (Gen. 15:9, Hebrews 11, Rom. 3:28).
- The importance of covenants (Gen. 9:8ff, Deut. 4:13, Heb. 9:15ff).
- The price of sin (OT sacrificial system/sacrifice of Christ in Hebrews 10).

PROGRESSIVE REVELATION

- God reveals Himself to man from age-to-age in the Bible as man could understand Him:
- A covenant with patriarchs (Genesis 18:19)
- A covenant with a nation (Exodus 19:5-6)
- A covenant with all who come to Him (Hebrews 8, Jeremiah 31: 31-34).
- Each covenant was a necessary stepping stone to a fuller, deeper understanding of God and His nature (Galatians 3:24-29).
