
## ACTS 15:12-21

- "Kept silent" Do we have enough respect for each other to listen, and not just talk over the one with whom we disagree? Remember James 1:19-20, Proverbs 18:2, 4, 6-7, 17:27.
- The ones directly involved in the issue and those most qualified to comment are the only ones contributing to the debate.
- The fact of God's grace to the Gentiles is established in scripture (Amos 9:11-12, Isaiah 11:10, 42:1, 49:6). On that point, everybody must agree.



## TROUBLING THEM

- Imposing a dress code
- Unreasonable expectations about maturity
- Assigning responsibilities too soon
- Treating every moral deficiency like a scandal
- Expecting immediate doctrinal agreement
- Even when it comes to issues that are not morally neutral, patience and prioritizing will reap spiritual rewards. This does not mean we "turn a blind eye" or express approval, though.

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- The leadership in Jerusalem takes responsibility for its members who cause dissension. This is admirable and provides a model for today.
- "One mind" This was not decided by a majority vote, but was unanimous after consulting scripture.
- "The Holy Spirit" Inspired men came to an inspired conclusion, and others were expected to receive it that way (1 Thess. 2:13).
- The decision prompted joy and relief.
